"A perfect home school? No. A good place to learn and grow? Yes. An unchanging formula? Never. Principles used in growing healthy, productive children? Absolutely!"

We also need to look at the results of research done locally concerning the current educational situation.

Katherine von Duyke: (Home school mom for 13 years): "Freelance teaching is a bit like freelance cooking. As I grew in skill, I began to notice that recipes I had memorised did not seem half as difficult to prepare as those I had to look up. It is like that with teaching...
